



TAKEAWA

Hong Kong, 26th January 2023: It is several weeks since I boarded my Qatar Airways flight out of Doha to Brisbane for a festive break Down Under. Time enough to reflect on my trip to the World Cup, where the off-field experience was just as brilliant as the football.

At face value, the idea of a nation such as Qatar hosting the World Cup is absurd. A tiny peninsular in the Arabian Gulf, it is just 11,586 square kilometres - smaller than the Falkland Islands - and is dwarfed by neighbour Saudi Arabia, which is 185 times bigger. But this made life much easier for me and thousands of other fans. At the last World Cup in Russia, it required planes, trains and automobiles, plus multiple hotel bookings, to attend 15 matches in four different cities. This time, I went to 27 games, frequently watching two a day, making full use of Qatar's fantastic

public transport network, and all from

my rented apartment base just outside

WHEN LESS IS MORE

NO BOOZE IS GOOD NEWS

Some fans were aghast at the last-minute decision to outlaw beer sales at matches. Clarification is required here: booze was banned in most parts of the stadium but was available in copious quantities in the hospitality suites. Double standards, I hear you cry, and you have a point. However, the arrangement made for a far more enjoyable - and safe - match-day outing. I've been to many major tournaments and seen some alarming scenes in which excessive alcohol consumption has usually been the key factor. In Qatar,

there was none of this. A sobering experience all around.

HARD-EARNED REWARDS Much was made pretournament of the toils of the migrant construction workers who built Qatar's impressive football stadiums and infrastructure. Given that non-Qataris comprise about 88% of the population, I had chance to chat with many imported employees from all industries - construction, transport, F&B and even the police (officers were on secondment from various countries, including Turkey, Pakistan, Egypt and Sudan). Their message was clear and consistent: yes, their work was often hard, but they were there out of choice and earned far more than in their native country. While acknowledging the construction fatalities, as the host nation did during the tournament, it is unfair to paint Qatar as unique in this respect. Migrant labourers are among the most vulnerable people anywhere on the planet, including Hong Kong, where our laws are stacked against them. Some perspective is required.

A KALEIDOSCOPE OF COLOURS

The beating heart of any World Cup is the fans. Noisy, exuberant, enthusiastic and bonded by a love of football, the estimated 1.2 million visitors who descended on Qatar turned a sandy outcrop in the Arabian Gulf into a month-long party. Many congregated at FIFA's Fan Festival. located at Al Bidda Park in the centre of Doha, where they could watch all 64 matches on big screens, visit sponsor booths, buy World Cup memorabilia and - yes - drink beer. In short, a nightly reminder that while football has grown into a multi-billiondollar global business behemoth, simple love of "the beautiful game" - a phrase

the capital, Doha. Perhaps this is what legendary Dutch coach Rinus Michels meant by "total football".



popularised by the late, great Brazilian maestro Pele - is its bedrock. You can't put a price on passion.

UNDER STARTER'S ORDERS One of the World Cup's rest days allowed me to attend camel racing, which has a long and distinguished history in Qatar. The sport turned professional in 1972 and meetings are held each Friday between October and February at Al Shahaniya, a huge oval track next to a camel mini-city where hundreds of the thoroughbreds are stabled. You can watch from the stands or, as my hosts insisted, drive your car alongside the leaders on a road next to the track, cheering them on. It was great fun. The best part? On the back of each camel is a toddler-sized robot jockey, kitted out in silks, remote controlled by its trainer. A case of ancient meeting modern. Don't ask if I backed a winner, though, betting there is illegal.

WELCOMING THE WORLD Qatar sees the World Cup as just

the start of its tourism explosion. The country welcomed some 730,000 international visitors in the first half of 2022. It is aiming for six million

a year by 2030. The government estimates around 80% of the world's population lives within a six-hour flight. Around 150 new hotels were built ahead of the tournament and they expect to stay busy in the years to come. Sports and pastimes (between matches, I enjoyed three rounds of golf), mega-events, cultural attractions and, of course. shopping will

be the pillars of Oatar's tourism push. Would I return? Definitely!

YOUR CULTURAL CORRESPONDENT I spent a pleasant few hours at the National Museum of Oatar. its 11 galleries revealing the nation's fascinating history in a series of displays showcasing exhibits, antiques. artefacts and films. At its core is the magnificent palace that once belonged Sheikh Abdullah bin Jassim Al Thani, Qatar's revered former ruler. It was his family home and once Qatar's seat of government. On another day I took in the Museum of Islamic Art, housed in a spectacular waterfront building designed by I.M. Pei. It contains a stunning collection of masterpieces curated from all parts of the globe. Both museums offered a truly memorable experience. And you thought I was only in Qatar for the football.

GRAND DESIGNS

(n Qatar built eight stadiums for the World Cup. I visited seven of them and saw many of my matches, including the final, at the 88,000-capacity Lusail Stadium. A spectacular venue, designed to reflect an Islamic hand-crafted bowl, it rises out of the desert sand on the northern

fringes of Doha. Equally impressive is the 69,000-seat Al Bayt Stadium in Al Khor City, 35km north of the capital, its striking design resembling a bayt al sha'ar (tent) of the nation's nomadic tribes. If these two venues have their roots in history, the iconic Stadium 974 just east of Doha is all about the future. Constructed entirely from shipping containers and modular steel, it is now being dismantled and is due to be rebuilt in a needy nation as a gift from Qatar. Useless trivia time: 974 is Qatar's international dialling code and the exact number of shipping containers used in construction.





AND FINALLY, THE FOOTBALL

England did what England always do: played reasonably well and lost to the first half-

decent team they faced (holders France). Qatar struggled gamely. Germany went home early (again). Portugal and Belgium were teams disunited. Brazil flattered to deceive. Morocco thrilled the Arab world with an unexpected run to the semi-finals. And Argentina, led by the ageless Lionel Messi, rose phoenixlike from the ashes of a shock opening defeat to Saudi Arabia to lift the trophy in a memorable final against France. I witnessed history being made. Roll on 2026 when Canada, the US and Mexico will co-host. I will be there.

WHAT IS HK4TUC?

HK4TUC is a challenge in which participants must run or hike all four Hong Kong long-distance trails non-stop, on their own and self-supported. Participation is by invitation only by Andre Blumberg, the Founder of HK4TUC. In this event, there is no entry fee, no course markings, no aid stations, and no prizes.

The total distance is 298km and approximately 14,500 metres of positive elevation gain. The sequence is MacLehose Trail (100km), Wilson Trail (78km), Hong Kong Trail (50km) and Lantau Trail (70km). Participants cover the trails in reverse direction, from trail end to trail head. The event starts in Tuen Muen and finishes at the green post box at the Mui Wo Ferry Pier on Lantau Island.



Participants have crew support between each of the four trails but not while on the trails. No pacers or outside companions of any kind are allowed. Participants take rest breaks, but the clock does not rest, and the total time also includes the transition time required between the trails. Trekking poles, music or sound playing devices, painkillers and anti-inflammatory are prohibited, and performance enhancing drugs are banned.

Participants completing the full distance in under 60 hours are deemed a Finisher while those who complete in under 72 hours are deemed a Survivor. With several time cut-offs this event is considered one of the toughest trail races.

2023 EDITION

This year, 25 participants from 13 countries were invited to join the event. The participants were surprised by the founder Andre Blumberg with a lastminute change in start time. Normally, the event starts at 9am on the day before Chinese New Year. 2023 edition started at 6:15pm on the day before Chinese New Year. Andre is known to change the rules last minute to bring in an element of surprise and unpredictability into the event and logistics. Every year until 2023, the

key cut-off was to board the 3am ferry from Central Pier 6 to Lantau in order to complete the challenge within the time limit. The change in start time in 2023 edition meant the cut-off was past midnight cross-harbour train link between Yau Tong and Tai Koo. This meant participants had to pace better on MacLehose and Wilson Trails.

FULLY SELF-SUPPORTED MACLEHOSE TRAIL

Vaid finished the 100km with over 5.000 mtr D+ trail in 15hrs and 36mins. It was a fully self-supported run with Vaid carrying all nutrition in the backpack. With the change in start time, all stores and noodle shops, especially the key Shatin Pass Noodle shop at 50km, were shut. So this meant relying fully on what's in the backpack. Vaid carried approximately 4kgs of nutrition and 1.5ltrs of water on him at all times with nutrition depleting as miles progressed. The plan was to replenish 240 calories per hour mainly sourced from carbohydrates. As per Vaid's estimates, he managed to consume close to 4,000 calories during the 100km run, but Vaid had burnt over 8,500 calories, which meant a deficit of over 4,500 calories.



DEHYDRATED ON THE WILSON TRAIL

Vaid was greeted by his crew **Theresa** Vaid, Brendan Lee and Bono Vaid at the end of MacLehose Trail in Pak Tam Chung. Remember the trails are being run in reverse. With a quick change in clothes and feet soaked in a small hot water tub, Vaid was swiftly transported to Nam Chung, the start of Wilson Trail. In less than 45mins from finishing MacLehose Trail, Vaid had started the Wilson Trail. Thanks to the super-efficient crew work, during the transition drive, Vaid was provided massage, food, new clothes, treatment for potential blisters, new shoes, etc. All these in 45mins while being transported to Nam Chung.

Wilson Trail is 78km with over 5,000 mtr of D+ elevation. It's harder because it's technical and comes right after MacLehose Trail. The effort level and feel factor are many notches above a normal day running the Wilson Trail by itself.

The key cut-off on the Wilson Trail was the 1am MTR link between Yau Tong and Tai Koo. If this train time is missed, then the runners have to stay on the Kowloon side until 6am for the MTR to resume services. As per the HK4TUC rules, this cross-harbour transfer can only be made through MTR. This year's weather presented new challenges. It was cool and raining on MacLehose Trail, but it was scorching hot on Wilson Trail, especially over Pat Sin Leng and Cloudy Hill. Most runners were dehydrated running these sections.

Vaid succeeded in meeting the cut-off and reached Tai Koo before midnight, and then started the long and steep final legs of the Wilson Trail, including Violet Hill and Twins. With heavy fog and failing headlamps, Vaid slowly finished Wilson Trail in 17hrs and 34mins. The crew was waiting for Vaid at Stanley Gap Road and swiftly transported him to Shek O.

HALLUCINATIONS ON HONG KONG TRAIL

This trail is meant to be the easiest of all trails because it is fairly runnable and not with much elevation. It's a 50km trail with less than 2,000 mtr D+. The HK4TUC rules require the athletes to start running from Shek O village and finish at Central Pier 6 where the Ferry departs for Lantau.

By now, fatigue had firmly set in. This was the second night without sleep. Bleeding blisters and sore calluses on feet had set off a need for rest. Constantly wearing trail running shoes for more than 33hours and hammering the feet and legs against Hong Kong's concrete trails had triggered fatigue that would now be hard to reverse. With multiple chinks in armour, it would be about managing the injuries and going along with the hurt. By the start of Hong Kong Trail, Vaid had burnt approximately 17,000 calories but had been able to take in 9,000 calories.

After a 30min nap outside the Shek O Public Toilets and a healthy dinner/ breakfast, his crew had him ready to third trail. Broad day light hallucinations started 40hrs into the run. Vaid saw small humans emerging from tree trunks and streams full of floating birds. Huge butterflies passed Vaid. When he closed eyes, he saw stars. To get rid of hallucinations and sleep, Vaid dunked his head in one of the streams on Peel Rise and he saw Pearls in the stream.

The easiest of the Trails turned into the hardest one. Vaid finished HK Trail in over 10hrs and 45mins. Way slower than his plan. But with low energy, fatigue and sleeplessness, it was nevertheless an acceptable outcome.

THE LONG WALK ON LANTAU TRAIL

After a 40min ferry ride from Central Pier 6, Vaid and his crew arrived Mui Wo. This is the start and finish of the last trail. Lantau Trail, 70km long, is also quite runnable but with two huge ascents and descents in the end. The unforgiving Lantau Peak and Sunset Peak. One of Vaid's friends once remarked, "you will love and hate Lantau and Sunset Peaks. Love because they are the last two climbs. Hate because they are so hard and you are so depleted."

Vaid was soon going to enter the third night without sleep. And he was starting Lantau trail in the evening which meant all stores would be shut, carrying all the food and relying on the streams for water.

Again, Vaid took a 45min nap at Mui Wo





Pier before being treated for blisters and feet issues. That night, the weather was to get very cold and windy. And it did. Strong monsoon winds triggered temperature drops. Sleepless into the third night and severe fatigue made running harder. Sections that are flat and runnable felt the hardest. With feet and legs screaming for rest, this was no time to slow down. But the body was doing exactly opposite of what the mind was telling it to do. Run 5mins and walk 1min. Instead. Vaid was running 1min and walking 5mins. Vaid and another athlete arrived Fan Lau and decided to seek shelter at one of the noodle shops. After a 3-hour nap in a cold and freezing make-shift kitchen. Vaid continued towards Tai O.

Lantau Trail that should have taken less than 15hours cost Vaid more than 21hours. Completing the HK4TUC is a dream come true. It's a very tough challenge and is only run by experienced and well-known trail runners. For Vaid

to be accepted into the challenge and then be able to complete it, a lifetime opportunity and journey.

This would not have been possible without the support of Theresa and kids who accepted Vaid's long training hours over weekends. The amazing crew support by Theresa, Brendan Lee and Bono Vaid was key factor why Vaid managed to complete. The trail running community encouraged the runner along the four trails.

KISSING THE GREEN POST BOX AND **CHAMPAGNE SHOWERS**

A trademark of the event is that the finishers and survivors get to kiss the Green Post Box in Mui Wo to mark the finish of HK4TUC and then they are spray showered in Champagne by Andre Blumberg. Vaid enjoyed kissing the Green Post Box and absolutely loved the Champagne showers. Vaid celebrated his "awakening as a trail runner" by doing a Shoey in Mui Wo.

BEHIND THE RECORD

A short movie by Suphattra Chu recollecting the contribution of amazing people behind the Guinness World Record for the fastest aggregate time to complete 10 marathons in 10 days on a treadmill. It features Vaid's family, coach, HKFC Sports Desk, Swim & Triathlon Society members, HKFC members, Record Adjudicator and University of Hong Kong Professors who worked tirelessly to make this dream come true.

The movie takes the viewers on a journey

in which Vaid runs a marathon every day for 10 days consecutively in HKFC Fitness Centre. This running event brings everyone together to realise one common dream. It's a story about patience, team spirit and human endurance.


CLUB SINGLES 2022



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




Michael is a bit of a HKFC journeyman, having spent many years with the 1st team, including a stint in the Premier League under then coach Richard **Ewart**, and then in Division One under Tony Hamilton-Bram who had this to sav:

"The Stats don't lie... Michael will no doubt be recognised as one of the best goal scorers that has represented the Hong Kong Football Club.

Michael was instrumental in the First Team's unbeaten season of 2017/18 (HKFA First Division), being the joint league-leading scorer with 26 goals in 26 games. Adding to this, Michael has a whopping 80 goals in 99 games when representing the HKFC in the HKFA First Division."

Hamilton-Bram described his running style as deceptive as he's a lot quicker than he looks, "like all good strikers, he has an eye for goals, and sees the game one or two steps ahead of the defenders. It's a pleasure to have coached Michael in the First Division, a good positive attitude and always a team player. If Michael were still in the Premier League, I believe he would have continued banging in the goals. Congratulations Michael."

Long-standing First Team captain, stalwart, and teammate of Michael, Frederick (Freek) Schipper recalled:


"Having played with Michael for many years in the First Team, I'm not surprised at all to see him score 100 goals in just 67 games. He's one of the best natural goal scorers I've played with and a real fox in the box. More importantly, though, he's a great lad and a real team player. Very pleased to see he's still going strong and I'm sure he will keep scoring for years to come!" Michael joined Albion in preparation for the 2019/20 season. Starting like an absolute train, the big No 9 scored 28 goals in the first 14 games to leave Albion top of the table, before the league was abandoned due to Covid.

Hampshire wasn't to be perturbed however and finished the 2020/21 season with 28 goals in 20 games to help Albion win the league and cup double.

In the 2021/22 season, Albion repeated the double feat, this time Hampshire scoring 23 goals in 19 games. The number nine has been the league's top scorer every year since he joined and currently sits with a healthy tally of 21 goals in 14 games!

Current manager Nick Day said: "I was delighted when Michael joined Albion because I knew he was an audacious football player who could score many important goals whilst also being a strong team player. I was born in Hong Kong and started playing football at around the age of 5. During my youth career, I played for Kitchee until the U16 age group where I switched to South China and had the opportunity to play for their reserve team for two seasons. I enjoyed my first stint at the HKFC in my final year of high school where I appeared three times for the club under Richard Ewart, before heading off to UC Davis in America for my studies where I was involved with the NCAA D1 Varsity Team. IST-RUMMER-UP



When and where did you start playing tennis?



How long have you been playing tennis at HKFC?



What's your favourite shot?


"I'd have to say an inside out forehand (when I pull it off)."




