s the sun sets on another exhilarating hockey season, we reflect on a year filled with remarkable achievements, camaraderie and growth. The 2024/25 season kicked off in August with our annual team trials and a vibrant start-of-season social, welcoming our new Director of Hockey Will Murray.

This season, HKFC proudly fielded seven teams in the HHKC league structure:

WOMEN'S HOCKEY

The women's section also fielded seven teams:

Ladies A & B Teams:

Both finished in the top 4 of the Premier League and reached the semi-finals of the Guv Dillon Cup. Notably, the Ladies A team triumphed in the HHKC Hockey 5s Premier League Tournament in January.

Ladies C Team:

Achieved a League and Cup double, finishing ahead of the Ladies D team who placed 4th in Division 1.

Ladies E Team:

Endured a tough season in Division 2, while our junior team, the Cubs (Ladies F), finished in 3rd place.

Ladies G Team:

Successfully navigated Division 3, culminating in an exciting run to the knockout semi-finals.











JUNIOR HOCKEY

Our junior teams showcased their talent in various local tournaments, with the U8 regularly finishing in the Top 3, and winning two tournaments. The HKFC Junior Hockey Festival continued to shine as the premier junior hockey event in Hong Kong, featuring 101 teams from across the SAR and Greater Bay Area, with HKFC fielding 16 teams across four age groups.



Saigon: In March, 16 Club tourists competed in the men's, women's and mixed divisions in the Saigon International Hockey Tournament, with the men finishing as runners-up.

TOURING PROGRAMME

This year marked the relaunch of our international touring programme, with 42 tourists participating in three tournaments across Asia:

Bangkok: In December, we took part in the 50th Royal Bangkok Sports Club's King's Cup where the women clinched the Plate final 1-0 and the men secured a 3-2 victory over RBSC in an interport match.

Singapore: In February, the Men's C and Ladies' E teams competed in the Singapore Cricket Club Sixes competition.

INTERNATIONAL HOSTING

HKFC solidified its reputation as the home of hockey in Hong Kong by hosting several major international events:

In November, we welcomed the Hockey Hong Kong, China Greater Bay Area Invitational, featuring Guangdong and Guangzhou women's teams against our HK Senior Women and Juniors, with the HKFC hockey juniors taking part as ball patrol and team mascots.

HKFC hosted the HHKC Annual Men's and Women's International Quadrangular Series in March. The

Hong Kong, China Men took on the national teams from Thailand, Indonesia and Chinese Taipei, coming second overall, with key contributions from James and Michael Shepherdson, David Evans, Ishtiaq Ahmed, Ken Tsang and Felix Iu. The Hong Kong, China Women were champions of their tournament, holding bragging rights over Singapore, Indonesia and Chinese Taipei. Ladies A team player Tiffany Chan was player of the tournament. Club players **Yiman** Chan, Melvina Cheng and Sze Sze Chuen also represented Hong Kong, China in the tournament.

We hosted an 8-team elite men's competition, a 5-team elite women's competition and 15-team mixed competition. In both the men's and the women's competition, the New Zealand hockey 5s national teams set the tone with some excellent play. The NZ women ran out as the inaugural champions, whilst the Kiwi men suffered a shock semi-final defeat to Hockey Australia Country.

The Aussies lost by a goal in a thrilling men's final to KNS. Over 250 athletes took to the field over the course of the weekend, with teams coming from Dubai, Bangkok, Beijing, New Zealand and Australia, while individual participants arrived from the UK, Holland, Germany, Belgium, Luxembourg, South Africa, the USA and Argentina. It was an epic weekend on and off the pitch with the quality of play on the field, some of the best hockey seen in Hong Kong for many a year; a real highlight for the local hockey community.

YURISA YEUNG REFLECTS **ON HER FIRST JUMBO DOUBLES ADVENTURE**

tepping onto the court at the Royal Bangkok Sports Club (RBSC) was an experience I'll never forget. From 2nd to 4th May, the club buzzed with energy as 71 teams – the highest turnout in 12 years - battled through 110 matches in only three days. And there I was, part of HKFC's six-team contingent (Carmen Lee with Nigel Anthony, Alan Ng with Singapore's Vincent, Jonathan Tjia with Julian Tanner, Adrian Ng with Malaysia's **Kenny Foo**, myself with **Mark Low**, and in the Masters event, Gillem Tulloch with Phil Head), diving headfirst into the chaotic, exhilarating world of Jumbo Doubles for the very first time.

FROM SQUASH TO JUMBO DOUBLES: A WHOLE NEW BALL GAME

If you think traditional squash is intense, wait until you experience Jumbo Doubles - it's

like regular squash turned up to eleven. Played on a court roughly twice as long and 1.5 times wider than standard, with four players battling it out, the game becomes a thrilling chaos of ricocheting balls, lightning-fast reflexes and strategic teamwork. Where singles squash is a duel, Jumbo Doubles is a gladiatorial team sport - exhilarating, unpredictable, and utterly addictive.

I have to thank my partner Mark Low for introducing me to this incredible format. His cat-like reflexes at the front

court saved us countless times, while I did my best to hold down the back. The dynamic was completely different from singles – instead of controlling the game, we were constantly adapting, communicating and covering for each other in a fast-paced dance across the expanded court.

BAPTISM BY FIRE: LEARNING THROUGH TOUGH MATCHES

Our tournament run was brief but packed with valuable lessons. First up: Under Control, featuring an ex-Singapore national player – their precision and shot placement were simply relentless. Though we fought hard, their experience shone through. Next, we faced HKFC's dream team of **Nigel Anthony** and **Carmen Lee** (a former Hong Kong pro and Tanglin Jumbo Doubles champion). Another tough loss, but what an honour to compete against such calibre of players!

While I wished we could have played more matches, those intense battles against world-class opponents taught me more about Jumbo Doubles strategy than any casual game ever could. The extended rallies, the need for perfect positioning and the absolute importance of teamwork left me completely hooked on the format.

MASTERCLASS VIEWING: THE FINALS THAT STOLE THE SHOW

Even when we weren't playing, the tournament delivered world-class entertainment. The finals between Kayod 1 (Philippines national team players) and Are You Ready (seasoned veterans) was an edge-of-the-seat thriller, with both games reaching 11-10. At championship point in the second game, Kayod 1's back player unleashed a straight drop that left their opponents stranded.

Watching these masters at work, I noted three crucial lessons:

1. Positioning is survival – Anticipating shots and cutting angles are more important than raw speed

- 2. Communication is oxygen The best teams called every shot and moved as one unit
- 3. Patience pays dividends Consistency and smart shot selection trump brute force every time

These insights have completely changed how I'll approach my next Jumbo Doubles tournament – hopefully with a more favourable draw!

THE RBSC EXPERIENCE: SQUASH, FEASTS AND CAMARADERIE

The Royal Bangkok Sports Club elevated the tournament from competition to celebration. Between matches, we feasted on unlimited drinks and delicious Thai food – fragrant curries, Pad Thai wrapped in crispy egg nets, skewers of grilled meat, coconut ice cream to cool the burn – all enjoyed courtside while watching the action. The atmosphere was electric – part highlevel competition, part squash festival – with laughter and cheers echoing constantly around the venue.

THE POWER OF SUPPORT

What made the experience even more special was the camaraderie of our HKFC contingent. Between matches, we became each other's loudest supporters – analysing games, sharing tips and cheering every point. Whether celebrating a spectacular rally or laughing at missteps, the team spirit turned the tournament into a collective adventure.

To all the partners and families who travelled to cheer us on – your energy in the stands, whether celebrating our best shots or encouraging us after mistakes, gave us that extra boost when we needed it most. This was never just about individual matches, but about our squash community coming together.

FINAL THOUGHTS: A NEW ADDICTION BORN

This experience exceeded all expectations – the high-level competition, the camaraderie and the sheer fun of Jumbo Doubles have me

completely hooked. Special thanks to Mark for the opportunity and HKFC for the support.

One thing's certain: I'll be back for more. More rallies, more chaos, more unforgettable moments. See you at the next Jumbo Doubles!





Jumbo by name, jumbo by nature, not only was the squash court massive (reportedly 6 times the size of a regular court) but also the tournament itself, with teams scheduled to play anytime between 8am and 12:15am, quarter past midnight, and that was before any delays.

Suffice to say, a lot of self-discipline was needed by players to "rehydrate" properly in the evenings before late night matches.

For anyone wishing to join a future jumbo tour, do get on court before the event or your match starts if you can. It's incredibly different – how much higher you have to hit on the front wall (rather than just harder) is very alien. The other big difference from regular Squash is the tactics with one in the front and one in the back. Both aspects were very hard to learn in a match setting. It was also evident which pairs had played a lot of times together.

Overall, it was a great experience. I learnt a lot and would certainly sign up for another tour and play again.

Most importantly, thank you to **Adrian Ng** and the squash section for organising and supporting – a great time was had by all. Personal dream comes true for me as well – taking Elizabeth to the Grand Palace and to meet a giraffe for the first time!

REPRESENTING LONG, CHINA





Justin Cheng shares his recent experience representing team Hong Kong, China.

This February, I represented Hong Kong in the Asian Junior Team Championships, playing in position 1. The tournament took place in Hong Kong and consisted of a group stage followed by knockout rounds. Our goal was to break into the top four and secure a medal, which meant we needed to beat either India or Pakistan.

Our group included Hong Kong, Thailand, Taiwan and Japan. Although Thailand and Taiwan were relatively comfortable matches, Japan was a formidable opponent; we had previously lost to them 0-2 in the World Junior Team Championships. Winning against Japan would enable us to face the loser of the India-Pakistan match, maximising our chances of reaching the top four.

For the match against Japan, the playing order was 3, 2, 1. We played in the centre court, and a supportive audience gathered for our home team. Given our past loss to Japan and my previous loss to the same opponent, I hoped both my teammates would win to alleviate the pressure on me. However, when our position 3 teammate, **Wong Wing Kuen (Rain)**, struggled with nerves during his match, I became even more anxious. He lost the first two games 5-11, 4-11. Although he played better in the later games, he ended up losing 1-3.



Next up was **Tommy**. We were confident he would secure us the win, and he did take the first two games. However, in the third game, while tied, he began taking risky shots and lost quickly. "He's injured," Coach **Faheem** muttered. **Tommy** limped off the court as physios rushed in with painkillers for his ankle. Despite the pain, he pushed through in the next game and won, tying the match score against Japan at 1-1. As he limped back out, he patted me on the shoulder and said, "This time it's your turn!" referring to my previous loss. I nodded and went to warm up.

I had a slow start in the first game but then engaged in a gruelling rally of 113 shots. From that moment onwards, I took the initiative. The points were long and exhausting, turning the match into a test of endurance. Finally, I won 11-6, 11-6, 11-9.

After Japan, we faced India, needing a win to secure a spot in the top four. The night before our match, we analysed the India-Pakistan games together. Unfortunately, the next day, I struggled against their position 1 player who was incredibly fast and consistently hit backcourt drops. Despite the games being close, he often pulled ahead at critical moments. I even had game ball at 10-8 in one game but still lost 0-3. Rain then lost his match 1-3, and suddenly, our hopes for a medal evaporated.

Despite our disappointment, we focused on performing our best in the 5-8 section. We defeated Kuwait 2-0, but then we had to face Japan again. This time, Ren played aggressively, but I lost 0-3. Disappointingly, **Tommy** followed with a close 2-3 loss, and we lost to Japan this time.



PETERSEN CUP 2025: HEAT, HANDICAPS HEROICS

TUESDAY, 3RD JUNE 2025 FANLING NEW COURSE

This year's Petersen Cup brought the drama before a ball was even struck. With eight evenly matched teams, each sitting comfortably at a team handicap of 10, things were looking perfectly balanced until the day before the event. A last-minute dropout led to a higher-handicap replacement, nudging one team up to a handicap of 11. There were a few mutters, a raised eyebrow or two, but it's Petersen: we crack on.

To add to the tension, the Hong Kong Observatory had hoisted thunderstorm warnings that morning. For a while, it looked like we might be playing in wetsuits, but with just 30 minutes to go before tee-off, the warning was lifted. Crisis averted... or so we thought.

What followed wasn't rain, but brutal, breathless humidity. The temperature soared and there wasn't a whisper of wind. It was so hot that even the most prepared players found themselves soaked through by the turn – and yes, there may have been a discreet shirt

SCRAMBLE WITH STRATEGY

The format stayed true to Petersen tradition: Texas Scramble, with a twist. Every player had to contribute at least three tee shots, but no more than six. This turned the captains' roles into a tactical balancing act – who hits when, and where, and how many shots are still to be used? By the back nine, some were calculating tee shots like accountants.

With thick air and tricky pins, it was a tough scoring day – only three teams managed to shoot under net 60, and those were our podium finishers.

POST-ROUND TRADITIONS

Sticking with tradition, the winning team made a successful plea to the bus driver

for a quick detour to the local 7-Eleven where they stocked up on celebratory beverages for all 21 passengers.

Chairman **Phil Head** took the mic (figuratively) and tried to rally the group into a game of Spoof. In theory, it was a great idea – but with 21 people guessing numbers from 0 to 63, the game quickly turned into a logistical marathon. Eventually, we opted for something a little simpler: cracking open drinks and enjoying the ride back with laughter and banter.

Massive thanks to our amazing committee members **Christina** and **Shane** for putting together a fabulous evening enjoyed by all.














*TAIPEI OPEN*2025


