FUNCTION: to raise and consider appropriate ongoing and new development initiatives in the short, medium, and long-term for Club's facilities with a view to recommending selected proposals to GC for consideration and implementation.

DISCIPLINE – Damien Laracy

FUNCTION: to process complaints and breaches of the Bye-Laws in accordance with standard procedures to be advised (and to ensure Club's Staff are briefed on these matters) and to apply appropriate sanctions to those Members found in breach. Finally, to provide information to assist GC in evaluating Membership acceptance/adherence to current Bye-Laws etc.

MEMBERSHIP - Don Rider

FUNCTION: to be responsible for admission of new Members, to monitor existing policies and to advise on issues involving membership, including procedural matters (including Sections) and enforcement of these policies.

SPORTS and RECREATION - John Thompson

FUNCTION: to facilitate the development of and Members' participation in recognised sporting activities and competitive recreational activities, and to work with Management towards the optimum use of the Club's sports facilities.





FOR THE FIRST TIME

HONG KONG U21 QUALIFIED FOR THE WOMEN'S JUNIOR ASIA CUP 2023!

"After a fourteen-hour flight and a three-hour stopover in Doha International Airport, we have finally arrived in Kazakhstan and are only four hours away from Taldykorgan where the tournament is held!" The Hong Kong U21 Junior Squad set off earlier this month to compete in the Women's Junior AHF Cup 2022, held from 12th to 20th October, in Taldykorgan, Kazakhstan. After 6 difficult games, the team has qualified for the Women's Junior Asia Cup, which will be held in 2023, for the first time in history.

fter two years of no competitions, we had a hard time rebuilding the junior team. Many talented players have left Hong Kong to study abroad, making the selection process even more difficult. In the final preparation stage, the team trained day and night (with extra training sessions on public holidays) to prepare for the games. Just when we thought we were finally ready to give it our all, some of our players got injured in the last week as they were not used to the sudden increase in training intensity. It was frustrating because we did not have

much time left, but there were still many uncertainties as to whether we could actually compete or not.

Fortunately, the U21 squad arrived at the destination safely and with the addition of 5 overseas players, the full team met for the first time in Kazakhstan. But little did the team know, the challenges had only just begun.

In a completely foreign country, we struggled to communicate with the locals and get the supplies we needed for the team. The first few days after we arrived, we had trouble sourcing still water because the labels were all in Russian/Kazakh, and we had a hard time adapting to the dry weather.

Despite the unfavorable conditions, our girls fought well and managed to score the opening goal of the tournament against Indonesia in the first game (final score 1-3) and draw Uzbekistan (0-0). In their third game, with 2 goals from Yammi Chui, a penalty corner goal from Caitlin Wang and a field goal from Hilary Wong, Hong Kong ended the game with a 12-0 win against Tajikistan. Thanks to the consistent performance of our two goalies Xinyao Liu and Yoyo Yip, the Hong Kong U21 Junior





Team was able to safely secure their spot in the upcoming Women's Junior Asia Cup.

Putting the tournament aside, the trip was also a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the girls to bond with local children (we played football together!), experience local cultures and try eccentric local cuisine like horse meat and camel milk.


All our teams have shown significant improvement both before, during and after RH Rounds 1 & 2 in October and November.


 $\mbox{U}11$ Squad A had a successful and fun day at the Sandy Bay RFC Festival.


















VEEZ VALK LOOP THE ISLAND

or the third year in succession, the Soccer Section is proud to be involved in the Weez Walk which is a fundraising family friendly challenge organised by the Weez Project and their charity partner KELY Support Group. The aim of the challenge is to raise funds and increase awareness of youth mental health issues and suicide prevention.

In previous years, the HKFC Junior Soccer Coaches have 'Looped the Island' to raise funds for this very special charity. This year, we are opening the event up to the rest of the Section and Club.

The Weez Walk 2023 will take place from 14th January to 19th February 2023 and it involves walking or running the Hong Kong Island Coastal Trail. The route spans 62km around the perimeter of Hong Kong Island where you can take in all the amazing sights and sounds of the island's coastal areas, from rural to industrial, from beaches to urban, this route has it all.

The Weez Walk was established by the Soccer Section Tony Bruno in 2021 in

memory of his son Jamie Bruno as a casual event to raise funds and awareness of youth mental health issues in Hong Kong. Tony completed the walk in 12 hours and 58 minutes, a personal best that will be hard to beat! Because of the success of Weez Walk in 2021, the idea of hosting a yearly event open to all was born.

The Weez Walk 2022 was an incredible success, involving over 700 runners, walkers and the occasional baby stroller and raised over HK\$2.1m.

The net proceeds from this initiative will go to KELY Support Group and be used fully to develop and deliver preventative mental health programmes for young people in Hong Kong.

They are a community group that is working to increase awareness of youth mental health issues and campaigning to prevent youth suicide.

Their **Vision** is for there to be zero youth suicides in Hong Kong.

Their **Mission** is for there to be help and support for young people in Hong Kong who are facing mental health challenges, especially those who are contemplating self-harm or suicide.

Their **Aims** are:

- To encourage young people to seek help for themselves and to help others.
- To help educate teachers and parents to know more about mental health issues.
- To advocate for improvements in youth mental health, including suicide prevention.

To achieve this, they collaborate with and raise funds for specialist youth and mental health organisations who have the expertise to deliver practical, relevant programmes and information for Hong Kong's youth and to provide accessible, expert resources to help young people and the adults around them. They also campaign for suicide prevention and improved mental health support for young people.





KELY Support Group (KELY) is a Hong Kongbased non-profit organisation whose mission since 1991 is to equip young people with the skills, knowledge and opportunities needed to support themselves and each other. They envision a world where young people are empowered to reach their full potential.

KELY Support Group collaborates with schools and other partners to offer programmes to Chinese- and English-speaking youth between the ages of 14 and 24 around our three core focus areas: Drug and Alcohol Awareness, Mental Health & Well-being, and Positive Youth Development.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL AWARENESS

KELY works to prevent and reduce the harm associated with drug and alcohol abuse. Their Drug and Alcohol Awareness programmes equip young people with the skills and knowledge needed to avoid using drugs and alcohol, protect themselves, make healthy choices and support their peers.

MENTAL HEALTH & WELL-BEING

They take a preventative approach to their Mental Health & Well-being programmes and focus on helping young people to understand their own emotions, cope with stress and know how to help themselves as well as their peers. In situations where they identify additional mental health needs, they work with a strong network of referral organisations that can provide in-depth one-on-one counselling

POSITIVE YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Their Positive Youth Development programmes create opportunities for young people to explore and develop life skills and creative expressions, increasing their aspirations for the future. They focus specifically on disadvantaged youth who typically don't have access to skills-building programmes of this nature.

BOXING DAY FESTIVAL



The precise date of the inaugural 'Auld Enemy', England vs Scotland challenge match, is a fixture which historians have been unable to determine but is thought to date back to at least 1892, coinciding with HKFC's controversial decision, despite vociferous dissent from the

membership, to accept Scottish members into the Soccer Section.

It was 2008 and, having recently returned to Hong Kong, I was looking forward to participating in the England vs Scotland challenge match. Alas, I was informed that the game had degenerated into a competitive and feisty affair, with the teams generally comprising of First Team and Yau Yee League players, with little or no social team involvement. Interest in the match had dwindled with the game not being held since 2004. The only football on the day involved the annual Swire vs Jardines. 'Jock's Pot' taipan challenge match, which I was invited to officiate.

Five days later, I attended the HKRU's annual New Year's Day Youth Tournament at the Club - a joyous, all day family event attended by over 2,000 players, family members and friends, socialising over food and drinks and involving a full day's youth rugby programme. I asked myself, "Why could the Soccer Section not aspire to hosting a similar football-based event?"

In **2009**, I was charged with reintroducing the annual England vs Scotland match, providing a greater emphasis on social involvement and a Section-based family event. Following the successful reintroduction of the fixture, a bigger event was planned for 2010, augmenting the annual England vs Scotland match and the 'Jock's Pot' matches with two

Initial response from the HKJFL teams was neither encouraging or supportive, with the U14 boys match eventually contested between two teams comprising exclusively of HKFC representation. However, the signs were encouraging and the seeds had been sown for development.

Whilst attempts to obtain event sponsorship from either Swire or Jardines failed to reach fruition, **2011** saw the introduction of the first Junior and Youth Soccer Programme supplementing the traditional senior matches, with four

boys' matches of different age groups arranged between HKFC select teams and both HKJFL and HKFA youth teams.

Whilst **2012** and **2013** provided an expanded Youth Football programme, with challenge matches for HKFC teams against outside opposition including Tai Tam and South China at U10 boys, U12 boys and both boys and girls at U13, there was still a reluctance for any participation by the majority of the HKJFL teams, albeit several HKJFL junior players supplementing the HKFC teams on the day.

2014 saw the first 'Festival of Football', with a full junior football programme prior to England vs Scotland fixture, which featured boys' and girls' teams of various age

groups and teams from HKFC, Kitchee and Sun Pegasus. The Junior Programme sought to introduce a sense of occasion for the young players by having all teams meet in the changing rooms where kits were hung with shirts on pegs, and the teams entering the pitch accompanied by the UEFA Champions League anthem, a tradition which persist to this day.

Although the England vs Scotland match was well and truly re-established and the day being enjoyed by family members, the reluctance of the HKJFL teams to participate in the Junior Programme persisted. This matter needed to be addressed for the Junior Programme to continue as a meaningful event.

The first thing I learnt was that Bobby had a nickname. Who knew? Clearly only those who were around in the 70s and 80s, **The Rubber Man**, not for reasons you might be thinking of but for having elastic legs and being able to make tackles like no other.

Bobby started out playing for the first team but I'll come back to that a little later. Bobby also played for 517 and Wanderers, winning the Yau Yee League alongside legends such as

Dave Anderson, Alan Liddiard, Les Curl, Tommy Nevin, Martin Stocks and Tommy Henderson.

In later years, Bobby played for the **Dynamics** with a cameo or two for the Rovers.

In 2009, I was charged with reintroducing back to the first team. Picture the Scene. It's the 1979/80 season and Hong

Kong Football Club is playing in the First Division. For those who need some help with the era, some key facts:

- MacLehose made the first trip to Beijing to discuss Hong Kong with the Chinese government
- Billy Semple was playing for Seko (Yes Scott's dad)
- The MTR opened its first line
- Tony Sealy was playing for Crystal Palace
- Pink Floyd were the Christmas No. 1
- Nottingham Forest retained the European Cup

The real action, however, was, happening in the Hong Kong First Division. 10th May 1980 to be precise, HKFC played Kui Tan and battled away into the dying minutes of the game 0-0 and on the verge of relegation, the game exploded. HKFC, with their backs to the wall for most of the game, not to mention the slight hint of favouritism shown to local relegation battlers in the lead up to this fixture, won a penalty in the last two minutes of the game. When John McGunnigle 'rammed' the ball home, the Hong Kong Football Club stadium erupted with a pitch invasion worthy of an FA Cup final.

Many of our members who have played at the highest level will let you know what an achievement this was to stay in the First Division.









It has been such a long time since our elite JAM, current junior national team player Coraline Lo had a chance to patriciate in her first overseas tour. She attended the Woncheon Yonex Korea Junior International Series 2022 in Miryang, Korea from 21th to 27th November 2022 and will carry on to Toyota Gazoo Racing Badminton Asia U17 &U15 Junior Championships 2022 in Nonthaburi, Thailand from 29th November to 4th December 2022.

Coraline started her Korea tour strong in her single discipline and won against a player from Korea in round 64 in 2 sets. However, her opponent from Japan in round 32 proved to be too strong and she lost in 2 sets. She also completed her doubles event in round 64 and lost in a tight game of 3 sets. Nonetheless, the experience was invaluable and will be able to prepare Coraline for her next tournament in Thailand.

November was a break for the senior national team and players were busy going on holidays. A few have decided to attend overseas training camps. Happy Lo went to Banthongyord Badminton Academy in Thailand, home of world ranking singles players including Ratchanok Intanon (world ranking #7) and Kunlavut Vitidsarn (world ranking #9). Not only did Happy have 2 weeks of very fulfilling training, but she was able to train alongside the legends and even spar with the top 20 singles players including Pattarasuda Chaiwan (world ranking #16).


triathlon consists of a 1.8k ocean swim followed by as 50k rolling hills bike ride and then a hot and sunny 12k run.


